NIGHTTIME BOATING

People who enjoy boating after dark need to be extra cautious because sometimes there are people fishing on the lake. Although the Michigan Department of Natural Resources recommends that every boat display a white light while adrift at night, not everyone does. Boaters need to slow down to minimize the risk of a collision. Along with reducing the risk of an accident, slowing down will help to lower the noise level and be less of a disturbance to others.

Don't Force The Gate

While it is inconvenient if your boat launch key won't open the

gate, the answer is not to force the gate open. If you encounter a



problem with the gate, please call the hotline (735-878-0340) and someone will contact you as soon as possible.

The Board realizes it can be very frustrating when you have made plans to use the boat launch, but forcing the gate will only result in costly repairs and more inconvenience for everyone.

2021 Lake treatments and Improvement Plans

As we start implementing our planning for lake treatments for 2021, we have learned that there will be a new team from Lake Pro that we will be working with.

Our new contact will be Tyson Wood who has worked with Lake Pro for several years and has been very "hands on" with our lake the last few years.

Because of deadlines to get this newsletter published, we cannot give the specifics on initial treatments since the first lake and vegetation survey will be taking place the week of May 10th.

In conversations with Tyson, we expect to have similar treatments in the main body of the lake to treat milfoil, pondweeds, etc. This treatment will probably take place the week of May 24th.

Since our area experienced a mild winter with minimal ice cover, we expect that vegetation growth is already taking place in the main body of the lake and the canals.

In the spring of 2020, there were strong dosages of herbicides that were applied in the north and south canals of the Moon Shadows area.



In the north canal, the herbicide "Clipper" was used to control

algae, milfoil and curly leaf pondweed. The 13.5 acres were treated at a cost of \$3,480.

In the south canal, there was extensive Eurasian Milfoil. This is an invasive plant that can spread easily and choke out an area. In 2020, the recommendation was to use a herbicide called "Navitrol" for the eight acres. This product goes right down to the root level and is very effective in treating this growth. The cost for this treatment was \$1,710.

Once the survey is completed, we will determine if we should use "Clipper" in both canals.

Looking ahead to future treatments, we expect to have a heavy application in the main body of the lake in late June and there will be additional algae treatments in the MSHOA canals in the summer.

Updates on lake improvement applications are always posted on our website: <u>rushlakepoa.com</u>.

Property owners should also keep in mind that areas of the lake that are treated will have a posting left on their property indicating restrictions to swimming, watering, etc. There are times when you may see the Lake Pro boat on the lake and if your area is not affected, you do not need to worry about restrictions.

At our June general membership meeting, the board will introduce a by-law change to increase annual dues. Dues have remained the same for 2019, 2020 and 2021. In order to continue investing in maintaining a high-quality lake for boating, fishing and swimming, the board seeks your support in approving the increases. These additional funds will cover rising herbicide expenses for treatments.

The actual vote for the increase will take at our October 4th meeting.

PARK USE IS FOR MEMBERS ONLY!

Please remember that our parks are only for the use of members and their guests! All of the substantial costs of maintaining these facilities are paid for by the Association.

It appears that nonmembers have been holding parties at our parks. This conduct should be discouraged.

Please keep this in mind when enjoying our wonderful parks. Also, pass this word along to your friends.

If you see any things that that are out of place or need to be fixed in our parks, be sure to notify our clerk, preferably by email.

DRIVING A GOLF CART ON MICHIGAN ROADS

To legally drive a golf cart on Michigan roads - which includes all of the roads within the Rush Lake area, the cart must be: - "street legal" i.e. having all the equipment needed to drive on a highway -The driver must be licensed to drive a car -The vehicle must be l licensed and insured.

DANGEROUSLY DRIVING BOATS!

A constant problem on the lake are boats that are driving dangerously! We all need to do our part to help keep our lake safe for everyone.

The Board urges all members using the lake to immediately call the police when they see any watercraft driving in a dangerous way.

If everyone would take this action consistently, our lake will become safer than ever!

REMINDER ABOUT SPRING BURNING

In the spring, burning is only permitted in the months of April and May Therefore, this year's permitted spring burning will end in just a few days.

Please Take A Minute...

With the busyness of summer, we often forget that our Association parks have a few rules in order to make them pleasant places for us all to enjoy. Please take a minute to review

what our bylaws have to say about the parks.



- Parks are closed at 11:00 p.m.
- No boats shall be stored or moored within the fenced area of a park.
- No boat shall be stored or moored by chaining to the fence of a park.
- No boats shall be anchored in the swimming area.

Consideration should be given by park users and swimmers from 9:00 p.m. to 9:00 a.m. the following morning so to not disturb the neighbors.

WHO MAY OPERATE A BOAT, OR A PWC = JET SKI - WAVE RUNNER

WHO MAY OPERATE A BOAT:

Those less than 12 years of age :

- may legally operate a boat powered by a motor of no more than 6 horsepower (hp) without restrictions.
- may legally operate a boat powered by a motor of more than 6 hp, but no more than 35 hp, only if they:
 - have been issued a boating safety certificate and have it on board; and
 - are directly supervised on board by a person at least 16 years of age.
- may not legally operate a boat powered by a motor of more than 35 hp legally under any conditions.

Those **born on or after July 1, 1996** may legally operate a boat only if they have been issued a **boating safety certificate** and have it on board.

Those **born before July 1, 1996** may legally operate a boat without restrictions.

WHO MAY OPERATE A PWC /JET SKI – WAVERUNNER:

Those **less than 14 years of age** may not legally operate a personal watercraft (PWC) (ie. jet ski, wave runner).

Those **14 and 15 years of age** may legally operate a PWC if they have obtained a **boating safety certificate**; **and** is

- accompanied on board by their parent, legal guardian or by a person who has been designated by the parent or legal guardian and is at least 21 years of age; **or**
- operating or riding the PWC at a distance of not more than 100 feet from their parent, legal guardian or by a person who has been designated by the parent or legal guardian and is at least 21 years of age.

Those **at least 16 years of age and born after Dec. 31, 1978** may legally operate a PWC only if they have obtained a **boating safety certificate**.

Those **born on or before December 31, 1978** may operate a PWC legally without restrictions.

PLEASE DON'T FEED THE WATERFOW

Waste produced by waterfowl can be a significant source of nutrients in the lake. Research has shown that one

Canada Goose can contribute approximately a half pound of phosphorus



to a lake each year. When you multiply that by the number of geese that are on the lake, a huge amount of phosphorus is added, causing an increase in plant and algae growth in the lake.

Particularly in locations where the geese gather, e-coli counts can rise making the water unsuitable for swimming, fishing or boating.

Besides the negative effects for the lake, feeding the waterfowl prevents them from consuming a balanced diet which can lead to wing deformity in goslings. In addition, when humans feed the waterfowl, they lose their fear of humans, and can become very aggressive, especially during nesting season.



Don't Let Your Dogs Run Free

In accordance with the Michigan State Leash Law, dogs are not allowed to run free.

Please respect your neighbors and their



property by keeping your dogs on a leash.

...Also please consider the safety of your dog by not allowing him to run free. For further information about enforcement of the lease law, contact the contact the Livingston County Animal Control 517-546-2154.



Be sure and take a few minutes to check your key to make sure it is activated before you are ready to launch your boat. Even though you may think your key is active, it never hurts to check just to be sure. It will save a lot of disappointment and frustration if you take the time to check it now.

No Boats In Swimming Areas

A number of members have expressed their concerns over the boats that come into the swimming areas at all three parks. According to Michigan boating laws, it is illegal to operate your boat in a restricted area that is marked by buoys. Our swimming areas are clearly marked by buoys, and yet, some people simply ignore the buoys. Please let's keep our children safe by keeping boats and jet skis out of t he swimming areas!

No Power Loading

Please do not power load your boat at the boat launch. Strong currents from the boat's propeller can cause severe

erosion and wash out the



end of the boat ramp. Please always winch your boat onto your boat trailer.
